Dr. McPhail has also served as the affirmative action officer for

Dr. Larry D. Johnson Jr. began serving as the second president of the Stella and Charles Guttman Community College-CUNY in July 2021. Prior to joining Guttman, he served as the first Black president of Phoenix College (in the Maricopa County Community College District)—a first in the college's 100-year history. He is committed to ensuring that first-generation college students and minoritized communities are granted access to educational and cultural experiences that increase their self-efficacy and social mobility.

As an engaged member of the academy, Dr. Johnson provides expertise and service to several organizations including the Presidents Academy Executive Committee of the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) and Phipps Neighborhood (NYC). He is the recipient of national and community awards such as the Power Players in Education (NYC), the Phi Theta Kappa Honors Society Paragon Award, and the Most Admired Leaders Award, to name a few. He is also a proud member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Incorporated.

Dr. Johnson has participated in national leadership programs such as the Carolyn Grubbs-Williams mid-level Leadership Institute (LDI) of the National Council of Black American Affairs (NCBAA). He was also tapped to join the inaugural New Presidents Fellowship by the Aspen Institute Community College Excellence Program.

Dr. Johnson holds a BA in English literature from Florida A&M University (FAMU), a Masters in Humanities and a graduate certificate in institutional research from Florida State University, and a Doctor of Arts in English literature from Clark Atlanta University.



Dr. Claudia V. Schrader is the president of Kingsborough Community College (KCC) of The City University of New York (CUNY). She is the College's 7th president, and she holds the distinction of being the first African-American in the College's history to hold that office.

Education has served as a vehicle for Dr. Schrader. She was born and raised on St. Croix, the largest of the United States Virgin Islands. She earned her undergraduate degree from Rutgers University and her Master of Arts, Master of Education, and Doctorate of Education from Columbia University, Teachers College. Dr. Schrader also obtained a certificate from the Institute for Educational Management at the Graduate School of Education at Harvard University.
